Through the generosity of our alumni and friends, the Chancellor's Building Futures Appeal has now raised gifts and pledges of almost £100,000. This fantastic support has enabled the University to accomplish its aim of centralising all student support services under one roof in the impressive Newton and Arkwright transformation.

The new Student Services Centre provides a suite of support services; careers quidance, one-toone counselling, advice on financial matters and help with accommodation issues. Integrating these services will have a positive impact on the student experience at NTU and will ensure that students, particularly disabled students, will find them easier to access and locate.

The Student Services Centre consists of nine private consulting rooms where students can receive confidential advice and support, plus an open area with self-service PCs for more informal matters. Donations have been gratefully received and have helped to furnish and equip the consulting rooms.

Projectors enhance learning

New Optoma EP761 projectors are now being used to enhance the learning of laboratory-based students in the School of Science and Technology, thanks to the Alumni Fund.

Optoma projectors are distinct from those normally used in teaching rooms or lecture theatres as they can be used in daylight. They have a higher resolution which means they can be used in a much wider range of settings, including laboratories.

Biosciences Lecturer, Dr Christian Thode, said: "The effective communication of scientific facts is an essential skill that students learn in our courses. These projectors enable us to simulate real-life situations, where students present and explain their posters in a laboratory environment – without printing them at high costs. With student numbers increasing, novel teaching practices, such as this one, help to maintain our high standards."

Until 31 July 2011, your gift will go even further with the government matched funding initiative. For every £3 donated by a UK tax payer, the government will give the University an extra £1.

Therefore a gift of £60 will ultimately be worth £100 to us, with gift aid and matched funding, at no extra cost to you.

Measuring success

Ongoing consumable costs for a BIOSEN C_line Sport analyser for use by students on the BA (Hons) Sport and Exercise Science course have been provided by funds donated by NTU alumni.

A BIOSEN C_line Sport analyser measures lactate and glucose concentration in the blood. Students David Brown and Katie Bayfield used the analyser during the completion of their level 3 dissertation, which focused on interventions that may accelerate lactate clearance from the blood, and hence recovery, following high-intensity exercise. The success of their project was evident when David and Katie presented their work at the 2010 British Association of Sport and Exercise Sciences (BASES) annual student conference.



First on the scene

Forensic Science students participating in crime scene investigation and forensic evidence photography exercises will now get the opportunity to use crime scene equipment which matches that used by UK police forces – thanks to the Alumni Fund.

Principal Lecturer, David Butler said: "Digital photography is now standard practice at crime scenes and when working on forensic evidence. I would like to thank the Alumni Fund donors for providing students with access to this specialist equipment. It is important that we can match standard police practice when training our students in order to enhance their employment prospects in the sector."

The Crime Scene Training Facility house, based on Clifton campus, has been so successful that both Nottinghamshire Police and Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs (HMRC) have used it to develop their own crime scene security and collection and preservation of evidence training programmes.





Our latest recipient of the Alumni Fund Award for Sport is flatwater sprint canoeist Joe Seaman. Committed to becoming 'the best of the best' in flatwater sprint canoeing, second year student Joe can be seen most mornings, bright and early, training on the lake at Nottingham Water Sports Centre – after which he'll head to the gym, or the pool, or go for a run around the lake.

Joe trains up to three times a day, six days a week - as well as studying for a BSc (Hons) Sport Science and Management. He says: "I have to plan my time wisely in order to fit in both studying and training. I try to reduce my stress levels by completing my university work well before deadline. I also have to sacrifice my social life – I'm normally in bed for 9.00 pm! I never go out on weekdays because I want to feel fresh for every training session, and I only go out at weekends if I have no training scheduled for Sunday."

Joe, who is currently ranked in Great Britain's top 15, is already looking ahead to 2012, "It's my ambition to be the best of the best as quickly as possible. After University I'm going to train full-time in the lead up to 2012 and compete in several World Championships in the meantime."

Joe really appreciates the generous donations made by alumni. He said: "I'm really grateful. Your support gives me great confidence and motivation when training and competing. It really opens up opportunities which I've never had before and hopefully it will lead me to my ambition – to represent my country in 2012."

Donations strike a chord

Chris Adams, a second year Biomedical Sciences student who plays in both the concert band and orchestra at NTU, has received the Alumni Fund Award for Music enabling him to purchase a soprano saxophone for use during his time at NTU, after which the instrument will remain at the University.

Additionally, this year's recipient of the Clifford Beck Music Award, an annual scholarship set up in memory of a former lecturer, is Ellie Fieldsend. She is in her third year studying Visual Arts, plays the piano and is also a member of the NTU Choir, NTU Chamber Choir and Youth Choir UK. She will be putting the money towards tuition for both singing and piano lessons.

She added, "Music is an important part of my life. I play piano everyday and sing all the time! I would like to say a big thank you to Clifford Beck's family for such a kind donation and giving me the chance to carry on with my piano and singing lessons."







Bringing Physics lectures to life

When Physics students were asked for end-of-module feedback they requested more lecture demonstrations. Thanks to donations to the Alumni Fund £1,700 has been spent on new technology for use in the lecture theatre.

New equipment purchased includes a high visibility multimeter with USB interface, transparent voltmeters to place on OHPs and large mechanical apparatus to visualise waves and wave phenomena including reflection, refraction and wave speed.

Senior Lecturer in Physics and Maths, David Fairhurst, said: "Physics is all about understanding physical effects and processes, the explanation of which becomes so much more vivid and memorable when seen live rather than in a PowerPoint presentation or with multimedia. Thanks to donors to the Alumni Fund, students can now enjoy good, clear lecture demonstrations. I've already had positive feedback from students who say they have enjoyed the demonstrations and found them really useful."

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
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
